Visits have not only strengthened my Human, Christian and Franciscan vocation but also have challenged me for the Gospel conversion in every day of my life.

Do I go to the first moment of my faith, my encounter with the Lord and hold it dear or feel like giving away when life is shaken by worldly trends? Maybe Jesus is telling us right now as He told his disciples, “If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me” (Mt. 16:24). What do I need to deny, what are the daily crosses that weigh me down and whom am I following? The first converts (early Christian community) “devoted themselves to the apostles’ teaching and fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers” (Acts 2:42). Do I follow the example of my first brothers and sisters of faith?

Franciscans commonly speak and stress on ‘returning to the root, returning to the rule’. St. Francis as a member of the church remained with the church in its difficult and challenging times. He was challenged by the heresies within the church but he firmly remained with the church to repair/rebuild. That was his calling from the crucifix; “Francis, “Go and repair my house, which, as you see, is falling into ruins.” Does the celebration of the feast of St. Francis help me to do this? What areas of my life do I need to repair/rebuild? And how can I be a builder of a good fraternity and wider brotherhood/sisterhood around me? May St. Francis of Assisi inspire, intercede and assist us in living our vocation and God’s mission.
