Laudato Si' and Climate Change

Dear brothers and sisters,

Many of you know that that the Encyclical Letter Laudato Si was written by Pope Francis in 2015. Laudato Si' in Italian is taken from "Laudato Si' mi Signore" which means "Praised be to you my Lord". The encyclical letter is about care for our common home: earth and is based on St. Francis of Assisi's Canticle of Creatures. "Praised be You, my Lord, through our Sister Mother Earth, who sustains and governs us, and who produces various fruit with colored flowers and herbs."

In Chapter 1, Pope Francis asked what is happening to our common home? He mentioned pollution and climate change. As you know, we are experiencing many catastrophes worldwide due to climate change.

The glaciers in the Arctic and Iceland are melting and sea levels are constantly rising, and the Antarctic continent is also melting. Coastal cities are being submerged, and some Pacific Island nations are being submerged. Atmospheric scientists are warning that humanity could become extinct due to the climate crisis. All of this is caused by greenhouse gases, carbon dioxide and methane that have been continuously emitted since the industrial revolution.

The permafrost in northern Russia has also begun to melt, and when these frozen soils begin to release greenhouse gases that contain far more greenhouse gases than currently exist on Earth, an uncontrollable disaster occurs. The permafrost contains methane, which is 25 times stronger than carbon dioxide.

As you know, all of these global problems are due to global warming caused by greenhouse gases caused by the use of fossil fuels. Fossil fuels, which began to be used after the Industrial Revolution, emitted 5 billion tons of greenhouse gases annually, and especially after 1950, after World War II, they were rapidly emitted, raising the global temperature by 1.1 degrees so far. Scientists say that by 2050 It is said that if the global temperature cannot be prevented from rising by 1.5 degrees, it will result in a huge climate disaster. Some are talking about human extinction. Many climate disasters have already occurred, and forest fires, droughts, floods, and cold waves are occurring at an unprecedented rate. In Lytton, BC, the temperature rose to 49.5 degrees last summer or so, killing 600 people, including the elderly. Due to the destruction of the ecosystem, many creatures have become extinct and are on the verge of extinction.

In the face of this global climate crisis, how should we Secular Franciscans act for the crying earth and the poor? How should I live my daily life? Let's discuss it together.
