

Spiritual Assistant Course

The on-line Spiritual Assistant course is called A Course for Spiritual Assistants. It was created by a committee from the OFS region of Trillium - including one of our National Spiritual Assistants Fr. Peter Knaapen OFM Conv. - and supplemented by the instructor, Br. Gerry Clyne OFM. It is primarily designed for those Secular Franciscans aspiring to become Spiritual Assistants for an OFS fraternity (other than their own). But as the course contains much general material on Franciscan spirituality, it is offered to those who may be interested in taking it for their own spiritual advancement.

The course consists of twelve chapters. At the end of each chapter are questions to reflect on and share with the instructor and the other students. Two chapters are scheduled per month. This course is not academic. Those who want to take the course should not feel intimidated. It is offered free of charge. The only thing that is required of the students is to put in a good effort.

The course provides the opportunity for Seculars from across Canada to meet online with each other. The sharing of reflections on their mutual love of serving Christ through the Franciscan charism creates friendships and strengthens the sense of belonging to a national Franciscan community. There will be occasional Zoom meeting as well where students get to see those they have been sharing with.

Franciscan Vision Global Summit: The July 29, 2023 Session

Fidelity to the Gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ and His Church in the Rule of 1223 and in the pontificate of Pope Francis. The July session of the Franciscan Global Summit dealt with the important issue of faithfulness to the Gospel and the Church, especially in today's complex world. It was presented by Br. Joseph Dolphy Pais OFM Cap., a priest who holds a doctorate in Franciscan Spirituality. Br. Arokiam John welcomed participants and invited the sisters of the Franciscan Missionaries of Mary (General House, Rome) to begin the session with a hymn to the Holy Spirit. Br. Joseph noted that his talk would revolve around the following:

- 1) Fidelity to the Gospel
- 2) Fidelity to the Church (in the time of Francis)
- 3) Fidelity to the Church (today)

Fidelity to The Gospel: Being truly faithful calls for one to be creative. What we are being faithful to must be reassessed and reaffirmed as the world and the people around us change. Fidelity thus cannot be static but must be a "living, changing process". Creative fidelity involves the willingness to trust, to be attentive to and to suffer with changes in order to bring about some newness. There is a huge cultural divide between life in the time of Francis and life of mankind today. So, is it possible to be faithful to the rule of 1223? Francis understood that the Holy Gospel contained all the law that was needed for the Christian to journey through life. The initial Rule, therefore, outlined ways in which friars could "live the Gospel". The four main foundations of the Rule were:

- 1) The friars must live in the spirit of the Gospel.
- 2) The friars must live in union with the Church.
- 3) The friars must live life fixed in contemplation of the poverty and humility of Jesus Christ.
- 4) The friars must live a life of obedience.

Following the rule required Fidelity to the Gospel which led to an evangelical life.

Fidelity to The Church: Francis desired a connection between the Church and his life. He went to the Pope. He found inspiration from the Gospels but desired papal confirmation. "Francis promises obedience and respect to the Roman Pontiff and his successors and the brothers are bound to obey Brother Francis and the Ministers General who succeed him." (Reg. B 1, 2-3). Fidelity to the Church involves a bit more. It demands avoidance of destructive criticism of the Universal Church. Francis was keenly aware of this: "And I desire to fear, love and honour them (priests) and all others as my masters. And I do not wish to consider sin in them because I discern the Son of God in them and they are my masters. And I act in this way since I see nothing corporally of the Most-High Son of God in this world except His most holy Body and Blood which they (priests) receive and which they minister to others." (Testament of St Francis 8-10 Francis and Clare – The Complete Works p. 154)

Obligation of the friars to recite the Breviary of the Roman Curia, at a time when many religious used their own breviaries or those of their Diocese also indicated that Francis wanted faithfulness to the Church. Fasting, a crucial dimension of prayer, followed the practice of the church and Francis additionally commanded the ministers to petition the Pope for a cardinal of the church to be "governor, protector and corrector of the fraternity."

Creative Fidelity to the Church Today:

The Rule communicates a way of living; a life chosen and shared. In it, Francis stressed:

- 1) Maintenance of relationship.
- 2) Retaining of a minority identity.

Striving towards these goals in the world today, one is presented with serious challenges arising from globalization and the complexity of modern technology, the situations facing the Church and the overall fatigue of the Order. (Friars are getting older while new enrollment is diminishing) To follow the Gospel life does not come by one's own initiative, but rather, it is a call. To live in the spirit of minority means to consciously choose to become a brother/sister; choosing Christ as a model of humility and choosing to live with others and share their destiny. It requires patience and humility. To encounter Christ in the downtrodden and the marginalised today would truly be a minority experience. As in Francis' time, the Church is in need of repair. Pope Francis recognises this. He appears, like St. Francis, to recognise that the church needs to be reformed from "bottom to the top" Francis took religious life to the streets. Pope Francis notes that we must "take to the streets to look for people." Francis guided his brothers to life in communion; walking together spiritually as companions on the journey of life. Pope Francis calls today for a synodal church, for lives lived in the mystery of communion. The synodal spirit requires trust and openness, a mature faith and fidelity to the church. This is the way of Francis of Assisi. This is the Franciscan way of life.
