Message from our Regional Director of Formation

Hello, my name is Catherine McNiff. I am your new OLOTA Regional Director of Formation. I believe that formation is the basis of our Franciscan Charism as Secular Franciscans and will do my best to serve you well in this position. I live in Sylvan Lake, Alberta - half way between Calgary and Edmonton - glorious in the summer and freezing in the winter! Liam and I have been married for fifty-two years and have three grown children and seven grandchildren. I am now a non-practicing registered nurse/midwife. I had the joy of working mostly with young families during my nursing career.

I was professed as a Secular Franciscan in 2009 at Sacred Heart Church, Red Deer and belong to St. Maximilian Kolbe Fraternity. I was OLOTA Director of Youth for two terms until the Chapter of Elections in September 2022. I have some experience in formation as I took the Formator's Course with Jewel Jasmins, ofs in 2015 and the Spiritual Assistant Course with Doug Hagen, ofs in 2016 while Brother Gerry Clyne was on Sabbatical. More than seventy people, including members of Little Portion Fraternity, attended the ceremony presented by the friars and enjoyed lunch and fellowship in the church hall afterwards. It was a great way to share our love of Francis and Clare, the spirituality of our charism and the *Transitus of St. Francis* with all our brothers and sisters.
