Regional Council Meeting on Oct. 17, 2020

Where are we today and where are we going? **3-year Overview of OLOTA Region**

• The Regional Council has completed most of the tasks list it adopted at the start of its mandate. In the past one and half years, OLOTA has introduced guidelines and checklists. Regional councillors will ensure they work properly and produce tangible benefits to fraternities, particularly in the areas of Fraternity Registers and Contribution form. The Contribution form could be a challenge because the data must come from local fraternity registers. Hence, proper recording of the status of Professed Members is paramount. The sample page

of the Fraternity Register was discussed at the regional meeting and it would serve as a guide to fraternities.

- The first stage of the OLOTA Handbook concerns reformatting the table of Contents to simplify finding the pages. The second stage is to update the Formation, JPIC, and Youth.
- A virtual regional council meeting has been scheduled in February 2021 to address our upcoming Elections in 2022 spring. Please pray to the Holy Spirit for the discernment of a theme and the selection of speakers.
- OLOTA has become more experienced with virtual meetings. Correspondingly, it has reduced its expenses and resulted in savings that may help fraternities that need financial assistance in attending the 2022 Regional Council Elections. Miriam Liem, ofs

DID YOU MISS THE WORKSHOP ON HOW TO START A FRANCISCAN YOUTH GROUP IN YOUR PARISH?

Ten of us met on in the afternoon on October 31, 2020 to explore how to start a Franciscan Youth Group in any parish.

We looked at first steps - introducing Franciscan Spirituality in the parish, talking to the pastor, advertising in the church bulletin, having information sessions after Masses, inviting parents to become involved, informing the local Catholic School principals.

We then looked at the needs of the different age groups with a template of how to organize a meeting. We looked at fun activities plus activities that centered on Franciscan spirituality – from five-year-old youngsters to the youth and young adults who will form YouFra groups - "stepping stones" to our Secular Franciscans of the future.

We had a group discussion on varied topics including engaging students during COVID-19 using platforms such as Zoom and forming intergenerational groups, an idea which has taken off in our communities during the pandemic.

Dear brothers and sisters in St. Francis of Assisi, may the Lord give you Peace.

Advent wreaths are circular, representing God's infinite love, and are usually made of evergreen leaves, which "represent the hope of eternal life brought by Jesus Christ". The four traditional advent themes for the four advent Sundays are: Hope, Faith, Joy and Peace. Many Advent wreaths also have a white candle in the centre to symbolize the arrival of Christmastide, sometimes known as the "Christ candle."

As we journey into the season of Advent, I wish that all of us are renewed in the Love of God, who came down from Heaven to create Love on the Earth (among us). I am sure all us long to live in a loving relationship with each other. She will be lovingly remembered by her children: Mary-Agnes Robinson Smyth (Tom), Garrett Robinson (Gordon), Frank Robinson, Jim (Tracey) Robinson and Janet (John) Zuk; brother, Gordon (Yvonne) Tidswell; sister-in-law, Ruth Robinson; grandchildren: Sean Tidey, Cathy Tidey (Garth), Andrew (Xuan) Robinson, Jordan Robinson, Rebecca Zuk, Sarah-Lynn Zuk; as well as numerous relatives and friends. Gwendolyn was predeceased by her loving husband of 28 years, Francis Robinson; grandson, Mark Robinson and her

parents, Mary and Jack Tidswell. Gwen Robinson, an academic, devoted Christian, mother of 5 and grandmother to many. Born and educated in Edmonton, Gwen attended U of A, graduated in the Faculty of

Science, married the love of her life Frank Robinson (deceased) and went on to achieve a degree in Education while her 5 children attended school. Gwen's first teaching experience was at the newly formed Terra School for pregnant high school students giving them an opportunity to continue their education during pregnancy and motherhood. This was followed with a position in the Christian Family Life program developed by the Catholic School System. During this period of her career, she began attending Newman Theological College and convocated in 1990. After retiring from the Catholic School System, Gwen became involved with the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults program (R.C.I.A.) at St. Matthew's Catholic Parish and continued well into her 80s. Professed into the Third Order of St. Francis in 1956, she lived her life following the teachings of St. Francis. Gwen was kind, generous and forgiving. She stood up for social justice and equality for all. She had an incredible zest for knowledge and willingly shared hers. Gwen touched countless lives, and all have been blessed to have been loved by her. Gwen Robinson, a life well lived.
