# The 8<sup>th</sup> Centenary of the STIGMATA: September 17, 1224 – 2024



In 2023 we celebrated the 8<sup>th</sup> Centenary of the Crib at Greccio, Italy when 800 years ago St Francis celebrated the birth of Jesus by recreating a live Nativity scene. We joyously ended the year with a Fine Arts Contest coordinated by Director of Youth, Marita Chouza. We received many beautifully created images of the Nativity creche by young students of all ages with some featured in the December OLOTA Messenger.

Onward into 2024 we now begin to contemplate and celebrate the 8<sup>th</sup> Centenary of the STIGMATA of St. Francis at Mount La Verna, Italy on September 17<sup>th</sup> 1224. (The Church celebrates on the 17<sup>th</sup>.)

About two years before his death, St. Francis had a second vision of Christ fastened to the cross. St. Bonaventure describes the scene in his *Life of St. Francis*: On a certain morning about the Feast of the Exaltation of the Cross [September 14], while Francis was praying on the mountainside, he saw a Seraph with six fiery and shining wings descend from the height of heaven. And when in swift flight the Seraph had reached a spot in the air near the man of God, there appeared between the wings the figure of a man crucified, with his hands and feet extended in the form of a cross and fastened to a cross. Two of the wings were lifted above his head, two were extended for flight and two covered his whole body. When Francis saw this, he was overwhelmed and his whole body was

flooded with a mixture of joy and sorrow. He rejoiced because of the gracious way Christ looked upon him under the appearance of the Seraph, but the fact that he was fastened to a cross pierced his soul with a sword of compassionate sorrow.

Seraphs are the angels closest to God, burning with love as they bow before the Most High God, shouting "Holy, holy, holy!" (See Isaiah 6:2-3.) Their fiery wings suggest the flaming intensity of God's love that Christ communicated to Francis which set Francis' heart afire. The word *seraphic* is often used to describe Francis' passion in relating to God.

As we look forward to the invitations ahead to contemplate/celebrate the Feast of the Stigmata, we pray: Lord Jesus Christ, we praise You and adore You. Like Francis, we are amazed that You held nothing back from us in pouring Yourself out for us so totally through Your holy wounds on the cross. We ask You to breathe forth Your Holy Spirit into us and set our hearts on fire, so that, with the Spirit's help, we might respond more fully to You. Amen.
